# Strength in solidarity will be crucial this October

# Celebrating the Unemployed Workers Help Centre

30 years, 2000 appeals, and over \$10 million in benefits

This fall will mark the 30th anniversary of the Unemployed Workers Help Centre. The UWHC is a classic and successful example of the social and economic benefits to the broader community that unions provide to all Saskatchewan workers regardless of any union affiliation.

The UWHC is an independent, community-based organization which provides information, advocacy and representation for Employment Insurance claimants in Saskatchewan.

The UWHC was founded in the fall of 1994 by a group representing Saskatchewan unions, community organizations and educators. The initial funding came from SFL, the Saskatchewan Building Trades Council, other unions and union centrals.

This group had recognized that workers in Saskatchewan were being denied or not accessing their UI benefits at a significantly greater rate than workers in any other province in the country. And they saw the solution to that in the creation of an unemployed workers help organization to ensure unemployed workers got the UI benefits they were entitled to.

The first office was established in Regina in space that was provided by the Prairie Regional Office of the Canadian Labour Congress.

The first official act of the organization was a presentation to a Federal Standing Committee of MPs meeting in Regina in November of 1994. The committee was accepting briefs and presentations from organizations in response to the government's intention to slash social program funding to provinces and, at the same time, make fundamental changes

to the unemployment insurance program which of course we disagreed with because of the negative consequences to unemployed workers.

The organization had immediate, significant success in representing workers with UI issues and disqualifications and as a result, a second office was opened in Saskatoon in 1997.

The second office in Saskatoon was established when the Calvert government of the time recognized the initial success and financial benefits to the province and its workers of the UWHC, and agreed to provide annual government funding to supplement the Saskatchewan union funding.

But to this day, over half their funding base continues to be through the generosity of Saskatchewan unions. In the past thirty years, the UWHC has represented and assisted thousands of workers from all corners of this province, union and non-union.

In 30 years, we have filed almost 2000 appeals for workers who have been disqualified, disentitled or faced financial penalties. Over 75% of those appeals have been successful; recovering at least \$10-15 million in El benefits for Saskatchewan workers.

We estimate their El claim advice, advocacy for workers and national El case law guide has resulted in several more millions in benefits for workers in Saskatchewan and has been of significant benefit for workers across this country who have successfully appealed their denied El claims using our El case law guide.

We say all the UWHC success is directly a result of the support of our sisters and brothers in Saskatchewan unions for the past 30 years. ||

Unions, workers, and labour-friend- the rail duopoly of CN & CPKC. ly Parliamentarians spent decades to get an anti-scab law on the books in Ottawa. Not only would it rebalance labour law for federally-regulated workers, it would set a precedent for provinces to follow.

What a milestone when anti-scab legislation was debated, passed, and became law in the summer of 2024, largely due to the support of the Liberal government.

Shortly thereafter, Minister O'Regan – a key proponent of the law resigned. That left a brand new Minister to oversee the labour dispute between Teamsters Rail and

### State of the unions

#### **Anti-scab update**

Since our last issue, Bill C-58 (anti-scab bill) has been passed into law, thanks to the work of Canada's unions and labour-friendly politicians in Parliament. Scabs undermine collective bargaining, which tips the balance of power to the employer.

With this new federal legislation, along with similar from the Manitoba NDP government, workers' rights are improving across Canada. In Saskatchewan, a change in government is needed, as the Sask. Party is not in favour of anti-scab rules, and has a track record of eroding workers' rights.

#### It's election time

Saskatchewanians go to the polls October 28. The SFL has been collaborating with politically active unions, along with a digital campaign framing top-of-mind issues to workers ahead of the election.

The most recent Speak Up Saskatchewan campaign has been one of the most popular, calling for an end to privatization in healthcare. Stay tuned for more exciting content from the SFL in the coming weeks.

#### **UFCW lockout eclipses one-year mark**

September 7 marked one year since 85 UFCW 1400 workers were locked out from the Heritage Inns at Moose Jaw and Saskatoon.

As the employer has demanded workers concede their entire benefits package and wage increases over a seven-year contract, these resilient workers continue to hold the line. One day longer, one day stronger!

#### **GSU** on strike

At the time of press, GSU Local 8 (Advanced Employees' Assoc.) has been on strike for several weeks, pick-

eting Advanced Tank Centres location on Henderson Drive in Regina.

Following a 100% strike vote, 75 workers walked off the job on August 8. Local President Doug Murray says that while they approached bargaining with an open mind, the frustrated workers demand fair pay, adequate benefits, and basic respect.

#### Change of guard at WCB, CUPE

This spring, Judy Henley was promoted to a full-time member of the Workers' Compensation Board. She had previously served as a part-time WCB labour member for several years.

Judy had to step away from her post as CUPE Saskatchewan President. Kent Peterson, our Secretary-Treasurer at the SFL, was elected as her successor in March..

Many congratulations to both Judy and Kent, who are both such strong proponents of solidarity and our Federation. The building trades' Dion Malakoff is the new part-time labour member of the WCB.

#### Singh breaks up with Trudeau

Federal NDP leader Jagmeet Singh announced at the beginning of September that the confidence and supply agreement with the governing Trudeau Liberals has ended.

At the time of press, an election was not imminent, but as CLC President Bea Bruske noted, "it will certainly raise the political temperature in Ottawa."
